Water for livestock & the landscape at Lowesdale

On their Lowesdale mixed farming property, Elise Weden and Ian Cocking have embarked on a process of wetland rehabilitation whilst securing livestock water supply.

This video shows the contrast from before the rehabilitation work to the 2022 spring condition. Inundation has enabled bird species to flourish, frogs to breed, and ground cover to explode and protect the previously denuded dam banks.

lan and Elise describe how they solved the problem of managing this tricky block by working with the landscape and the natural water flow.

Climate tools for on farm decision making

The Bureau of Meteorology, in collaboration with industry partners, has developed and released a set of 5 new Climate Forecasting tools in a project 'Forewarned is Forearmed'. These tools have been developed to provide further intel for tactical on-farm decision making and better prediction of extreme weather events.

Tools include:

- climate outlook maps for extreme rainfall and temperature
- · location-specific decile bars for rainfall and temperature
- timeline graphs; probability of exceeding (rainfall only)
- three-day burst outlooks (rainfall only particular amount within a 3 day period).

As part of the project, workshops are being offered to gain feedback for improving the tools and workshop delivery. Information presented will assist farmers in interpreting forecasts and probability and utilising these tools for practical on-farm decision making around extreme weather events.

Managing your stock feed gap

Coming into the cooler months and shorter day lengths, pasture and legume growth will slow. We are encouraging Murray farmers to consider what the 'stock feed gap' might look like this year, and what steps you can take to minimise the issues arising from this.

A stock feed gap typically occurs when feed quality (pasture, grain, supplementary, etc) does not meet the energy requirements of

livestock. If not identified and addressed early, stock may start to decline in condition and

production losses may be seen. With widespread flooding throughout the Murray region in 2022, there may be a shortage of hay, silage and potentially feed grain. If you haven't got feed on hand, it could be difficult to obtain, and be a reduced quality or higher in cost.

Farm business management basics workshops

Farm Business Management is an essential part of any farm business. However, getting your head around some of the key concepts is often confusing, especially if you're new to farming, or in need of a refresher.

Basics workshops throughout June across the Murray LLS region. These one-day workshops will help participants develop a greater and clearer understanding of some basic principles of Farm Business Management. It will also develop skills to help manage the farm business now, as well as planning for the business into the future.

Participants will be provided with a range of take-home tools and have the time to begin to apply them to their own business. A maximum of 15 participants per workshop has been set to ensure a great learning environment.

Return your cereal crop tests

In December 2023 we asked farmers to participate in a new program to get their retained cereal, such as wheat, durum and barley, tested for potential disease free of charge.

Our staff worked with NSW Department of Primary Industries to bring lab tests to the farm gate to help growers identify and stamp out cereal diseases such as crown rot, with more than 300 test kits distributed.

We are now asking farmers to return their kits to enable testing to take place and provide you with an in-depth report to

Yabbies & yarns

Yabbies are found in rivers, lakes, swamps, and other wetland environments. They are a vital food source for many native species, such as Murray Cod, Golden Perch, Cormorants and Ibis. Yabbies also play an essential role in breaking down decaying plant and animal matter.

In partnership with Murray Local Land Services, Western Murray Land Improvement Group provided a free community event to celebrate World Wetlands Day on Sunday, 26th February 2023. The event attracted 44 attendees, including Deniliquin Local Aboriginal Land Council members.

A community bus was provided to visit Pollack Lagoon. At the Lagoon, attendees learned about the importance of restoring our wetlands, the significance of keeping water in Aboriginal Heritage sites, recreational fishing compliance and the best way to catch and cook yabbies!

After exploring the aquatic life in the nets, learning of the yabby lifecycle, and visiting the Barapa Barapa mounds and ponds, the community returned to Murray Connect to have salad rolls, sample freshly caught yabbies and have a yarn together.

The feedback to improve the day was to have more events and to be able to catch more yabbies!

Good time to drench for liver fluke

For livestock grazing fluke-prone areas, control can be achieved through strategic testing and drenching. It is worth factoring in some routine monitoring tests with your vet, particulary during the late summer and early autumn, to help determine the presence of liver fluke on your porperty and guide drench decision making.

Late autumn, after the first few frosts, is an ideal time to drench for liver fluke. Colder temperatures generally kill off the host snail and is an ideal time to break the life cycle of the parasite. Burdens may be heavy and made up of both adult and immature fluke, so at this time of year be sure to use a drench which is effective against all stages of liver fluke (ie. a triclabendazole-based drench).

Maccas returned to Mannus!

The future of the endangered Macquarie Perch, or 'Maccas', in the NSW Upper Murray is looking brighter, with the reintroduction of juvenile and adult fish into Mannus Creek following the 2020 bushfires.

Mannus Creek contains one of 4 remaining populations of Macquarie Perch in NSW Murray Darling Basin, and the only population in the NSW Murray region. It is highly significant from a genetics perspective and was the focus of much ongoing research and management to secure the population prior to the January 2020 bushfires. The fires were followed by heavy rainfall which increased ash, sediment and debris in creeks, and reduced oxygen which devastated waterways and led to fish kills.

In February this year over 2,000 juvenile Macquarie Perch and several adults were released into Mannus Creek, near Tooma, by NSW Department of Primary Industries Fisheries, Charles Sturt University's Gulbali Institute and Local Land Services. The juveniles were bred by Victorian Fisheries Authority at Snobs Creek and were released to boost the numbers of Macquarie Perch in Mannus Creek and increase the genetic diversity of the local population.

Supporting Our Neighbours boundaring fencing

Closing soon!

Supporting Our Neighbours is a grants program helping landholders with the cost of rebuilding boundary fences adjoining public lands following the 2019/20 bushfires.

The program achieved some great outcomes including 4,561 applications received and 3,473 funded, with nearly 8,500 km of fencing bordering public lands re-constructed.

Due to a number of challenges encountered by landholders completing fencing, including COVID-19 impacts, severe storms, floods and prolonged wet weather and conditions, the administration of the program was extended by 12 months allowing landholders additional time to complete their fencing and submit documentation.

This extension period will be closing on the 31 of May 2023.

New applications for this program have closed, however, landholders who received funding and have not submitted their documentation should do this by the 31 of May 2023. This includes returning a signed copy of Schedule C acquittal documentation and 2 photos.
